WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS TO VOTE?

It is almost time to go to the polls. This November 6th is the day to choose who you want to represent your views and needs as an elected official. In 2016, over 35 million people with disabilities were eligible to vote, but only 16 million did, reports the American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD). If you don't vote, you are letting someone else decide what will happen to you and your community. Help us make sure *our* community is registered, educated, and engaged to exercise their civil right to vote! A good place to start for Salt Lake County is **slco.org/clerk/elections/voter-info-look-up/** to register or see if you are already registered and also who will be on your ballot. For information statewide, **vote.utah.gov** has candidates, propositions and more.

Be a Mystery Voter — Help Improve Voting Site Accessibility

Will you be a mystery voter? This Fall's General Election is coming. The Disability Law Center looking for voters across Utah to help improve the election experience for voters with disabilities. Mystery voters will vote at their polling place on a voting machine and report about it. The identities of mystery voters will be confidential.

How mystery voters will drive change: You will be asked about your experience using the voting machine, accessibility, and poll worker performance. This information will be shared with election officials to advocate for improvements. Your feedback will also be used to recognize counties doing a good job.

Summer Youth Program 2018 Wrap-Up

What an exciting and busy summer youth participants and staff members had here at UILC. As was the case last year, the UILC offered two summer programs — a 3-day and a 2-day program. Each program was different and was tailored to meet specific student needs.

The 3-day program was community based. On Monday, everyone went out into the community. We visited Fatcat's, Nicklemania, City Creek Mall, Clark Planetarium, University of Utah Fine Arts museum and Gallivan Center for a summer



concert. We traveled on UTA buses and Trax so every student received bus training, which is a cornerstone of independence. On Wednesday, we stayed at the Center and students focused the entire day on mastering one independent skill. Lessons included bus safety, personal safety, money management, transition to adult services, employment and social skills. On Friday, we again traveled on the bus or Trax to different grocery stores to learn about nutrition, couponing, estimating total cost, comparing prices and shopping. We purchased our groceries and returned to the Center to make either breakfast or lunch. All meals focused on functional cooking. We made burritos, grilled cheese sandwiches, spaghetti, waffles, pancakes and omelets to name a few. We even visited the Murray Farmers Market which was a first for many of the students. The final Friday was Party Central with a barbeque, carnival games and a water fight. The program ended on August 8th with over 30 students and staff traveling up Big Cottonwood canyon for a walk around Silver Lake and lunch. We spent the rest of the day at the Spruces playing games, hiking, having marshmallow gun fights and enjoying s'mores, chili and hotdogs cooked over an open fire.

The 2-day program, the Empowerment and Leadership Academy, was based on learning job readiness and selfadvocacy skills. The students visited three job sites where they learned about different employment opportunities: Elizabeth's Catering taught us about food service careers, at Deseret Industries we learned about retail and at the Megaplex at Jordan Commons, we learned that the Larry H Miller Company employs over 1000 part-time employees in one of three jobs, ticket sales, food service or janitorial. Some of the other highlights were mock interviews conducted with a Vocational Rehabilitation counselor, learning to prepare a healthy lunch at Harmons, how to dress for an job interview with Dressing for Success, learning interview skills with Workforce Services and visiting a Public Housing site. Every student left with a printed resume, personal recommendation and a certificate of completion from Vocational Rehabilitation.

During this past summer, over 75 students in Salt Lake improved skills needed for everyday living. UILC staff would like to see even more students experience these opportunities for growth next year. If you are interested in joining us for either program in the summer of 2019, please call and ask to have your name added to the mailing list. Applications will go out mid-April 2019. You must be 16-22 year old to attend either program.

Pick-up, delivery, transfer, or payment for the device will be determined by the individuals involved in buying/selling/donating the items. 
Example 2 Board Member Trades Skiing For Fun In The Sun.
